## CHRIST'S BAPTISM AND OUR OWN

During the course of my priestly ministry, I was assigned to Seven Holy Founders Parish in St. Louis on two occasions, from 1989 to 1993 and from 2000 to 2006. In 1993, a few months before I was transferred to Our Lady of Sorrows Basilica in Chicago, I was called to the hospital to baptize two tiny infants born very prematurely. They were so tiny that neither boy was expected to survive. With the parents and several nurses in attendance, I placed a few drops of water on the forehead of each newborn. Shortly after my return to St. Louis seven years later, I was distributing Communion at our First Communion Mass. It was the custom in our parish for parents to walk up with their child who was receiving their First Communion (and hopefully receive Communion too). As one boy approached, I looked up at the parents and I froze in place. Tears came to my eyes. This was one of the twin boys who had not been expected to survive. His brother had died, but he had lived. Here he was a healthy seven-year-old!

This is the story of one infant who was baptized; but what about all the others? In the Archdiocese of Chicago in 2020, even with our churches closed for three months and attendance limited after that, there over 13,000 infant baptisms. The year before, under “normal” conditions, there were more than 20,000. The other night I totaled up my own numbers. In the fifteen years that I have been at Assumption, I have baptized 562 infants. Where are they now? With the kind of housing available in our area, it is not surprising that growing families will leave for larger quarters and other faith communities. But on this Feast of the Baptism of the Lord, it is worth stopping to think about what our baptism means for us now.

Clearly for Jesus, baptized as an adult, baptism marked the beginning of his public ministry. At his baptism he was revealed as God’s beloved son, and was thereby obliged to undertake the mission to which he had been called. That is also true of the rest of us. When infants are baptized, they are anointed to be priests, prophets and shepherds: to share in the worship of the church (priests), be persons of integrity who speak the truth (prophets), and lead others to Christ (shepherds). What a load to place on a baby! Why do we do this? Well, the baptism of infants and small children can be traced to the earliest days of Christianity; but, as the Bible suggests, it started when an entire household became followers of Christ. The baptism of infants coincided with the conversion of their parents. Clearly the parents were making a commitment to raise their child in the faith, since they were making this same commitment themselves.

As our theology of baptism developed over the centuries, there was greater emphasis on the necessity of baptism for removing original sin and paving the way to heaven. Cultural norms also developed in many places that an infant’s first trip outside the family home had to be for her baptism. The presumption still was, however, that baptizing a child was a time for parents and godparents to renew their own commitment to their Catholic faith. That is a strong feature of the baptismal liturgy. Parents are asked at the beginning of the ceremony if they are prepared to take responsibility for raising their child in the practice of the faith, and in the intercessions, we pray that parents and godparents will be examples of faith to inspire the child. If neither parent or godparent is willing to commit to raising the child in the faith, that is grounds for a pastor or pastoral minister to delay (but not refuse) to baptize an infant. Yet, how often in life and in church matters do we settle for formalities? We say what is expected of us, even if we do not mean it. Fr. James Mallon in his book *Divine Renovation*, describes how this attitude of settling for external observance has invaded all of our sacraments. He writes, “If we get so accustomed to settling for externals, how long will it be before we settle for externals in our Christian lives, without the corresponding internal reality? Was this not the central critique the Hebrew prophets had about the religious systems of their time? Was this not the heart of the conflict Jesus had with the religious establishment of his time?”

There are so many influences on children today that it can be frightening. And it is not just children. All of us need to be sources of encouragement to one another to live the life that was professed for us at our baptism. How well are we carrying out the commission we received at baptism, to take on the work of Christ as priest, prophet, and shepherd? And, if we were given a good foundation in the faith by our parents, how responsibly are we treating that gift?

We will meet virtually with Cardinal Cupich and the representatives from the other parishes on Thursday evening, January 20. The final phase of the process is to draw up an action plan for Assumption, a plan to which everyone here will be invited to contribute.
